## From The Principal's Desk

There was an interesting news article earlier this year regarding parents sleeping on the footpath outside a Brisbane school in order to gain an enrolment spot for their child/ren for 2021. Dedicated mums and dads camped on the footpath in tents and chairs outside the school on a Sunday night, in an effort to secure their child a coveted place.

While children who reside within the school's catchment area are guaranteed enrolment, others must vie for the remaining spots.

Applications for students not living within the catchment zone were accepted annually from 9am on the first Monday in March. Parents started arriving from 4pm on Sunday for Monday's sign-up day.

This school received top marks in audit data for the highest performing school which was published in the media.

A St Mary's School was in past years named the best school in Scotland.

Inspectors identified the following key strengths.

- · The broad and well-balanced curriculum and excellent provision for pupils' spiritual, personal and social development.
- · Motivated, enthusiastic and confident pupils who were achieving very well in a broad range of areas.
- · The outstanding quality of teaching and pupils' learning experiences.
- · Commitment of all staff to the care, welfare and inclusion of all pupils in the life of the school.
- · High quality teamwork which ensured consistently high standards and outstanding ethos of the school.
- · Active involvement of parents in supporting their children's learning and very positive links with the parish team and wider community.
- · Leadership of the head teacher, senior management team and all staff and approaches to evaluating and improving the school, including the meaningful involvement of pupils in these processes.

So how effective is our catholic school?

When I was younger, to assess our teaching and the effectiveness of the school I first taught at, my principal, Sister Margaret, would ask, "Would you enrol your child at this school?"

This challenge made me evaluate; how I was teaching, my relations with all members of our school community and how I was nurturing the values of Jesus Christ, within each child.

Families, children and staff are constantly evaluating the effectiveness of their school which is greatly appreciated.

Two years ago, we undertook an intensive school review. This process celebrated and affirmed the good things going on and hopefully brought about change thought to be worthwhile and necessary by our school community.

Late this Friday, all our families will receive an email survey from a group, MYP Corp, seeking your opinion on a range of issues relating to Sacred Heart, Yeppoon. The information gained from your confidential responses will be correlated into a report about our school.



It will most importantly provide our leadership team, teachers and staff with information about how we have progressed in improving our school in line with the recommendations set out in the 2018 school review.

Thank you, in anticipation of your survey responses which will ultimately lead to a 'better' education for our children.

Speaking of change, on Wednesday, I returned to the office to find a neatly folded letter on my desk. It read:

Here is something for you to think about.

This week, I proudly watched our students analyse and reflect on their slide challenge from last week. Some were more critical of their designs than others, but all were able to recognise their achievements and how they could improve on their creations.

Taking the time to reflect on our learnings and achievements is a skill with which even adults can struggle. Reflective learning is a way of allowing students to step back from their learning experience, helping them to develop critical thinking skills and improve on future performance by analysing what they have learned and how far they have come.

Reflection is an important skill that gives the brain an opportunity to untangle and sort through experiences to create meaning. This meaning becomes learnings, which can then inform future mindsets and actions.

The International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (ICAS) provides an opportunity for all Year 3 to 6 children to gain a measure of their own achievement in an external testing situation. The assessments are completed online and cost \$15.95 each.

ICAS assessments will take place between Monday17th August through to Friday 4th September 2020. All tests are completed during school time.

## **Queensland Health COVID Safe Survey**

In recent days, all members of the school community have been emailed information and a link to a short Queensland Health survey collating information about the Central Queensland public's interaction with the Federal Government's COVID-19 tracing app.

This information is valuable to Queensland Health and they would appreciate as many community members as possible completing the survey.

With the aim of moving towards a COVIDSafe Australia, it is requested that all parents assist Queensland Health by completing the short survey.

#### NCCD - What Do I Need To Know As A Parent / Carer.

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) is a yearly count of students by all Australian schools. The aim of the NCCD is to provide the Australian Government with information about the number of students with disability in schools and the type of adjustments they need in order to access and participate in education on the same basis as other students. From 2018, the NCCD has been used by the Australian Government to inform funding for schools, known as the 'student with disability loading'.

If you are a parent or carer of a child with a disability who requires ongoing adjustments at school, a teacher or another school staff member will consult with you to understand your child's needs. This collaborative approach ensures the most appropriate adjustments are chosen to support your child's learning and participation at school. In some cases, an individual education plan (IEP) or personal learning plan (PLP) may be developed to document specific educational goals and to review your child's progress over time.

Your child will be included in the NCCD if they require ongoing adjustments at school due to a disability as defined by the Disability Discrimination Act 1992. This is a very broad definition of disability, which includes physical and intellectual disabilities, learning disorders such as dyslexia and dysgraphia, and mental health conditions such as anxiety and depression. The Disability Standards for Education 2005 set out the obligations of schools towards students with disability. Under the 2020 NCCD Guidelines, every effort should be made to inform parents/carers that a student has been included in the NCCD.

If your child has a disability, your child's school will provide information about them for the NCCD, including:

- your child's year of schooling
- the category of disability that best describes your child's difficulties (one of four categories is chosen by the school team to reflect your child's greatest area of need: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional)
- the level of adjustment your child receives at school (one of four levels is chosen by the school team to reflect the
  type of support your child requires: quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary adjustment, substantial
  adjustment, or extensive adjustment).

While it is not possible for schools or families to 'opt out' of the NCCD, the privacy and confidentiality of all students and their families is treated with utmost importance. Data is collected within each school, and personal details, such as student names and other identifying information, are not provided to local or federal education authorities.
