## From The Principal's Desk

This week has certainly been an oxymoron. Each day has gone so quickly yet the week appears to have taken so long. With all that has been happening at school, in our community, across our nation and around the world, even though we are not directly affected, many are feeling like a holiday is in order already.

With this in mind, I came across a renowned book entitled, 'Seven Habits of Highly Effective People' by author, Stephen Covey. Reading it gave me a slightly new lease on life.

Now being highly effective does not necessarily mean being the managing director of a company or the owner of a successful business, it means being great at what you do. A great mum or dad, a great secretary, a great teacher, a great bank manager ....

Covey points out, as lots of people have beforehand, that success is about happiness and fulfilment. He then delves into the seven 'habits' which can nurture your personal growth.

In the first chapter, he suggests you pretend you are on your deathbed and to visualise who is there and what would you like to have achieved by this moment. What personal characteristics would you like to have admired in your eulogy?

This strategy helps clarify what 'centres' your life. Will you seek reconciliation with your God, comfort of your family, accolades from the media? The Prime Minister at your funeral?

Well, the point he then makes is to write down those main goals and then seek them every day. The trouble is, Covey points out, not so much 'dying early' but dying late with regrets. Interesting.

Another of Covey's principles is 'sharpening the saw' which at this time seems very relevant.

He relates to a story about you coming upon someone in the woods working feverishly to saw down a tree.

"What are you doing?" you ask.

"Can't you see?" comes the impatient reply. "I'm sawing down this tree."

"You look exhausted!" you exclaim. "How long have you been at it?"

"Over five hours," he returns, "and I'm exhausted. This is hard work."

"Well, why don't you take a break for a few minutes and sharpen that saw?" you inquire. "I'm sure it would go a lot faster."

"I don't have time to sharpen the saw," the man says emphatically. "I'm too busy sawing."

This habit makes all the others possible. 'Sharpening the saw' means preserving and enhancing the greatest asset you have - you. It means having a balanced program for renewal in all areas of our lives: physical, mental, emotional, social and spiritual. Covey states that without this discipline, the body becomes weak, the mind mechanical, the emotions raw and the spirit insensitive.

I do not know whether things would become that drastic however it does make us aware of the need for some 'down' time, doing something to re-energise ourselves especially after such an unusual and unsettling school year to date.

Finally, I was reading about the winners of an international pun competition and it is amazing how clever some people are. Here are a few winners and the writing of puns could become a pastime for some that may help to 'sharpen your

saw'.

#### From The APC

Last night while watching the news, the presenter was discussing the impact that 'Karen from Bunnings' was having on the other Karen's of the world. My daughter, who is in Year One, proceeded to tell us how many vowels and consonants were in the noun, 'Karen'.

As a teacher who is immersed in the 'common language' of our word study at Sacred Heart, my response to her was, "Well done honey, now please finish your dinner". My husband on the other hand was overly impressed by this conversation and wondered why I wasn't on Google, researching extra curricular activities for child geniuses.

It brought to my attention, the importance of a common language and the sharing of this beyond the classroom, to our parents. Our word study at Sacred Heart encompasses four areas:

- 1. Phonological- how words sound (hearing phonemes, saying phonemes, segmenting words into syllables and phonemes)
- 2. Visual- how words look (representing phonemes with correct graphemes and using visual memory to work out if words look right, memorising irregular words that are hard to decode)
- 3. Morphemic- how words can be broken up into morphemes (e.g. prefix, suffix, base word, root word)
- 4. Etymological- where words come from (word origins and history)

To assist us to close the gap between the common language used at school and the language our children are bringing home to you, please click on this 'cheat sheet' for the phonological area of spelling.

#### **School Photos**

Our school photos will be taken on Thursday 13th August at school.

Due to COVID restrictions, there will be no whole class photo taken, only individuals.

There have been some queries about not being able to have group photos.

Following is the explanation from MSP Photography why they are only doing individual photos.



"I need to mention social distancing. We appreciate that current guidelines advise that social distancing doesn't apply to students but it does apply to staff. As visitors to schools, it's important that our photographers maintain social distance from both staff and students where practical. Unfortunately, this means we currently can't take photographs with multiple subjects in them until further notice, and this includes:

Class group photos. Staff group photos. Extra-curricular photos. Sibling photos.

Photographs with multiple subjects require our photographers to be very close to the subjects to help position them where required. Given that we are visitors to schools, this close contact is considered an unnecessary risk. We have an excellent process for individual photographs that allows our photographers to maintain a safe social distance so we will use that process for the time being in lieu of group photographs.

For class and staff photos, each student or staff member will be photographed individually, with the group created digitally as a composite. This will eliminate the need for students and/or staff to be grouped together in close contact with either themselves, or our staff."
