From The Principal's Desk

Many years ago three soldiers, hungry and weary of battle, came upon a small village. As the kettle boiled on, the memory of the village improved, soon barley, carrots, beef and cream had found their way into the great pot and a cask of wine was rolled into the square as all sat down to feast.

They ate and danced and sang well into the night, refreshed by the feast and their new-found friends. In the morning, the three soldiers awoke to find the entire village standing before them. At their feet lay a satchel of the village's best breads and cheese. "You have given us the greatest of gifts, the secret of how to make soup from stones", said an elder, "and we shall never forget." The third soldier turned to the crowd, and said, "There is no secret, but this is certain: it is only by sharing that we may make a feast". And off the soldiers wandered.

Teaching our children empathy is an extremely important part of their holistic development and very much part of our school's religious education program. Empathy is the ability to put yourself in the shoes of someone else and understand what they are feeling or experiencing.

It is through experiences similar to Crazy Sock Day that a child's sense of empathy is hopefully heightened.

In the coming weeks, we are asking all our families to contribute to the 'Linking Alms Christmas Appeal' (Alms means the giving of material items to the needy) in support of our local St Vincent De Paul which does an outstanding job assisting families and individuals financially and emotionally over the holiday/Christmas period.

These donated items can be brought to school. Last year, the response from our families with festive season foods, toys, decorations etc was overwhelming and hopefully, we can be as generous this year.

The story of the 'Stone Soup' is a reminder that together we are able to assist with the spirit of giving during the Christmas period which for many of our Yeppoon and school families is a difficult time.

After World War II, German students volunteered to help rebuild a cathedral in England, one of many casualties of the Luftwaffe bombings. As the work progressed, debate broke out on how to best restore a large statue of Jesus with His arms outstretched and bearing the familiar inscription, 'Come unto Me.' Careful patching would repair all damage to the

statue except for Christ's hands, which had been destroyed by bomb fragments. Should they attempt the delicate task of reshaping those hands?

Finally the workers reached a decision that still stands today. The statue of Jesus has no hands, and the inscription now reads, 'Christ has no hands on Earth but ours.'
