It can be a difficult space. It is expensive. People seem to think they 'know' everything. Wherever you go, you must present a gracious face; nodding politely and greeting those, you know are privately fanning rumours and possibly misplaced grudges. However, this is also the experience of my friends, leading schools, even 'flash ones', in our capital city.

And so I bid our Assistant to the Principal Curriculum, Mrs Samantha Suthers farewell, as she heads to her promotion as principal of St Joseph's Blackall.

Samantha heads west fully knowing the country town experience, having taught in Blackall before. I think this shows the quality of her dedication to Catholic Education. Samantha revelled in small town life and has, before, dived in boots and all to everything community has to offer. With her confidence and friendly manner, we are sure Sam will wow them again.

St Joseph's gain is our loss. Who will put in 100% to coordinating anything? Who will be able to understand and solve our IT issues? It is a very fortunate school that receives a principal so wise at curriculum and passionate about promoting contemporary teaching and learning. Samantha's energy level is extraordinary.
