# From The Principal's Desk

There is a famous story of two university students who decided to go to the beach for the weekend and were having such a good time they decided to miss their mathematics exam that was scheduled for Monday morning in order to get some final waves before they headed back to uni. They decided to tell their lecturer that they had a flat tyre and therefore deserved to take the exam at a rescheduled time.

Hearing the story, the lecturer agreed that it really was bad luck, and of course, they could take the exam later. At the appointed time, he met them and placed them in two separate rooms to take the exam.

The few questions on the first page were worth 10% of the overall mark and were quite easy. Each student grew progressively confident as they took the test, sure that they have gotten away with fooling the lecturer. However, when they turned to the second page, their joy turned to despair. The only question on the page, worth 90%, read: "Which tyre?" A valued lesson in honesty.

Testing and assessment are an important part of our children's education.

Teachers use assessment information to monitor children's progress and to make professional judgements in order to: Inform children, parents, carers and schools about the demonstration of learning outcomes within a class. Make decisions about children's needs, the learning and teaching process and the use of teaching resources. Set learning goals with children, parents and carers and guide how we plan school and class curriculum programs.

For assessment to be effective, it needs to be focussed on our children's demonstration of their learning outcomes, be comprehensive, develop our children's ability to monitor their own progress, be an integral part of the learning process but not the overriding part, be valid and reliable and take into account the needs of every child in a teacher's class.

Over the coming weeks, teachers are meeting with leadership to analyse data collected from our children completing a PAT Spelling diagnostic test, a Word Analysis test and a DRA (Diagnostic Reading Assessment).

These three pieces of assessment will be used by our teachers to effectively influence their teaching and student's learning.

It is said that assessment at its best functions as a reflective and evaluative tool for learning. It importantly involves children as well as teachers and creates a dynamic in which children take on the ultimate responsibility for the quality of their work and their learning.

Our teachers are quite comprehensive in their assessment whether it is done informally or formally and they spend a lot of time recording our children's progress across all Learning Areas.

During weeks three and four of next term, interviews will be held at school so that both teacher and parents/carers can meet to discuss how their children are 'going' academically, socially, personally, spiritually at school.

In the coming weeks, all families will receive an email in regard to organising an interview time for next term. Please take the time to read over this correspondence and be serious about arranging an interview time.

So let's celebrate our children's educational achievements and then it is up to us as parents and carers to take an active interest/role in how our children are going at school and work in partnership with our child's teacher to further nurture their education.

I wonder how the following incident would be assessed and reported. Commonsense and initiative may be high on this child's skills criteria.

This week while playing cricket on the oval during first break, one of our passionate cricketing Year 1s after bowling his over, asked if he could go to the toilet. After telling him he did not have to ask, out of the corner of my eye, I saw him run off to the bushes adjacent to the pitch and proceed to discretely have a wee.

On his return to the game, to field near the wickets, I asked him what was happening and he told me it was too far to the toilets. Very logical.

# From The APC

On Tuesday this week, I had the opportunity to participate in a webinar to unpack the expectations and key components of NAPLAN 2021.

Students in Years 3 and 5 will participate in NAPLAN, completing assessments for writing, language conventions, reading and numeracy. All assessments, with the exception of Year 3 writing, will be completed online.

NAPLAN is a point-in-time assessment that allows parents to see how their child is progressing in literacy and numeracy against the national standard and compared with their peers throughout Australia. At the classroom level, NAPLAN provides additional information to support teachers' professional judgement about student progress.

NAPLAN will take place between Tuesday 11th May and Friday 14th May (Week 4, Term 2). There will be the opportunity for students to complete make up tests the following week if they were absent from school during the testing period.

Students will also sit a practice writing and omnibus test (combination of reading, language conventions and numeracy test). This will give students the opportunity to experience the NAPLAN platform and gain confidence prior to participating in the NAPLAN assessments in Term 2.

### **Interschool District Chess Competition**






