If you don't go to a parent-teacher interview, you're also missing out on the chance to hear the positive things about your child that they may not tell you themselves. It's just as rewarding for teachers to share good news with you. Also, the ways in which you can assist your child with their learning.

Parent teacher interviews are not a 'necessary evil' to be avoided but to be celebrated.

Noah: Relieved. Now that I am older I will know what to expect in Year 7.

Evie: Challenging. I am glad it is over. I feel relaxed now. It was better after the first test.

Alex: Unknown. I feel better now that it is over. Not as bad as I thought.

Indigo: Amazing. No more worrying about if I am going to do well.

Quin: Unpredictable (the questions). Relieved and not worrying about getting to school for NAPLAN.

Beckett: Exciting and happy because I finished and did my best.

Saige: Enjoyable. I feel proud that I got it all done.

Oscar: Happy because I wasn't scared and I finished all of it before the time was up.

Josie: Challenging. I feel good about myself for trying.

Chelsea: Confident. Relieved, I finally got it done.

Cooper: Nervous. I was excited because I think I got a lot of questions right.

Walk Safely to School Day (WSTSD) - Friday 14th May

WSTSD is an opportunity for parents and carers of Primary School aged children to promote safe pedestrian behaviour. This day reminds parents and carers that they need to closely supervise their young children, particularly those under 10 years of age, in all road environments, holding hands when near or crossing the road.

The objectives of WSTSD are:

- To encourage parents and carers to walk to school with primary school age children and reinforce safe pedestrian behaviour.
- To promote the health benefits of walking and help create regular walking habits at an early age.
- To ensure that children up to 10 years old hold an adult's hand when crossing the road.
- To help children develop the vital road-crossing skills they will need as they become mature pedestrians.
- To reduce the car dependency habits that are being created at an early age and which will be difficult to change as children become adults.
- To promote the use of Public Transport.
- To reduce the level of air pollution created by motor vehicles.
- To reduce the level of traffic congestion.
