Three friends contribute \$10 each towards a \$25 pizza. They give the delivery driver a \$2 tip and get \$1 change each. But something weird has happened! Each friend contributed \$10 totalling \$30. They received \$1 change each so really paid \$9 totalling \$27. The driver has \$2 bringing the total to \$29.

Where is the missing dollar?

In May this year, our Year 3 and 5 children sat the NAPLAN test. Our 5s did all this testing online while our 3s also did all but the writing task, online. The above question was not on the NAPLAN numeracy test but I am sure it had your brain 'ticking over' as were our children's back in May.

Yesterday, our Years 3 and 5 children brought home their results from the NAPLAN tests. These were held in every Australian Primary School and your child's results are compared to the national average in the areas of Numeracy (Mathematics) and Literacy (English).

There is a brief summary on the front of the result sheet explaining how to read your child's results. If you however have any concerns about this, do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher, Mrs Lisa List or myself.

These results will be used by our teachers this year and next to assist our children in areas of need and also to celebrate their successes. The national test results represent a snapshot of each child's achievement at a particular point in time.

They are but one form of assessment used to measure students' development and should be considered in relation to other aspects of our school's assessment.

Sacred Heart will continue to monitor the results of these tests and use this information to plan for improvement in our children's learning.

Mrs Lisa List in her role as curriculum coordinator at Sacred Heart and each classroom teacher have viewed the test results. Once again if you have any questions, please contact our school.

There is always much publicity about the NAPLAN data release, as there is every year, but little recognition of the hard work of those who educate our children.

I wish to thank the teachers at Sacred Heart and affirm their continuing hard work and commitment.

While NAPLAN is one measure of students' achievements and the basic skills it tests are very important, I know that the education received by children in our school is rich and holistic, providing them with the opportunities to hopefully reach their full potential and put them in good stead for their future development.

From Our APC


As a member of the leadership team and teacher at Sacred Heart, child safety is at the heart of what we do.

On Wednesday, last week our school leadership team, Kelly McKenna, our school counsellor and Sarah Hill, our after school hours care coordinator, participated in the Rockhampton Diocese Catholic Education's annual Child Protection Professional Development day.

This week, as part of National Child Protection Week, our Prep students participated in the Daniel Morcombe 'Australia's Biggest Safety Lesson'.

The key messages of Recognise, React and Report were instilled through the story of Little Red Riding Hood. The story unfolds with Little Red's mother reminding her not to talk to strangers and if she ever feels unsafe, she has her 5 safety helpers with whom to talk.

After participating in the simultaneous lesson, our Prep students created a booklet using the resources provided from the Daniel Morcombe foundation.



Keeping Kids Safe

The Daniel Morcombe Foundation provides a range of free Keeping Kids Safe resources for parents and carers. They are continually developing new fact sheets to help educate young people about their personal safety, as well as providing adults with the tools to talk about safety with children.

Pizza Day - Year 6 Camp Fundraiser







The cost is \$10 per child with all proceeds going to St Vincent De Paul.


Children will be placed into teams of 12 with a teacher/adult supervising each team. 6 players are on the field at any one time. We are hoping to have at least 8 teams taking part.


