Maybe you have the same joy in your life? Over 20 years ago, I spent the best \$5 of my life. We bought a 'pound puppy' and our kids named her Biscuit. The little pup had been badly mistreated and spent the first few weeks cowering whenever a child approached her. Biscuit was a cross between unknown parentage and a chihuahua - fox terrier. One would expect a yappy, nippy little dog to be the consequence. However, Biscuit was sweet natured, grew in confidence and became a lovable and energetic companion for our three children.

We walked her when we could and, somehow, her little legs walked the 6 kilometres in and out of town. Biscuit became the Queen dog of the neighbourhood and had a wonderful life, befriending all of the pets and people in a 2 kilometre radius. In Emerald, she was known and loved.

At Christmas, there was always a special snack and a toy or some doggy reindeer antlers under the tree.

After almost 17 years of living and loving with us, we found Biscuit collapsed on our front lawn. The vet confirmed our fears, she was in coronary arrest and had been for days. 'But she walked 6 kilometres yesterday', my wife exclaimed. 'She's a tough old thing', the vet replied, 'these bitzers always are'. So with her tail still wagging, she was gently put to sleep. A sad day for our family. Our sons, although mid-exam block, spent the evening driving around St Lucia, crying and watching dog videos. With dignity, we had Biscuit laid to rest under a cotton farmer's lemon tree.

Last weekend, my wife was at Indooroopilly Shopping Town. Being a freshly minted grandmother, she slightly melted the credit card, buying frilly clothes that our new granddaughter, Maggie 'had to have'. On her return, she reflected on how many shops she accidently picked up a baby t-shirt to realise it was 'doggie apparel'.

Her other reflection was, she only saw two nativity scenes; a tacky gold one and a rotund, naïve child's set. Where's the true Christmas she wondered?

As the countdown to Christmas continues, 30 days to go, buy your pet a present, if that is what you are into. Spoil the kids, have a drink with a neighbour, ring distant relatives, give to vulnerable families. But don't forget that 'truth' of Christmas. Dogs, family and friendships are so important but so too is the deeper meaning of this oh so precious season; a little boy was born 2000 years ago.

His life flipped the theology of the time on its head. He walked with the outcasts and said everyone was welcome in the Kingdom of God. The tenets of Christianity underpin our law system and societal norms. Approach the season with joy and spend some time in prayer, giving thanks for all of your blessings.

You will then need to sign into the ACEN member collection (it will prompt you to do this twice).


Your child will need to use their school Google login and password credentials.

## **Children's Report Cards For Semester 2**

Assessment is an extremely important part of any learning and teaching process and with this in mind, on Tuesday 30th November, your child / children will receive their Semester Two report card, through the Parent Lounge portal.

Your child's report is a written record of their demonstrations of learning. It represents a summary of progress based on judgements made by their class teacher from formal testing, work samples, regular consultation and observation.

This written report provides just one means of communicating your child's faith, intellectual, social, emotional and physical development at school. It is important that we as parents/carers discuss our child's report card with them.

Following are the achievement codes for your child's report. To accommodate the developmental learning needs of young children, achievement in Prep, Years 1 and 2 will be assessed against different six point achievement codes to those in Years 3-6. These are explained in much more detail on the report card.

They are as follows:

Prep: Applying. Making Connections. Working With. Exploring. Becoming Aware. Modified.

Years 1 and 2: Very High. High. Sound. Developing. Support Required. Modified.

Years 3 to 6: A. B. C. D. E. M (modified)

The children's progress in regard to their social and application skills are also assessed and this is another important aspect of our children's development. This looks at how they work in class, complete classroom tasks, follow directions, accept responsibility and interact with their peers.

I thank our teachers for their time, effort and professionalism in writing their children's reports. They will provide families with an overview of your child's progress.

# **Rockhampton Youth Parliament**

Yesterday in Rockhampton, sixteen of our Year 6 students attended a Youth Parliament organised by the Queensland State Government.

They joined children from four other district schools to debate two motions, one dealing with Education measures, the other with Health issues.

- That Queensland schools will become mobile device free zones:
- The introduction of monthly online-safety programs for every student in Queensland schools; and
- That schools basing more than 80% of learning on non-electronic activities will receive a grant towards purchase of reading materials for school libraries.
- The introduction of a tax on junk food;
- That advertising of junk food should be banned; and
- That schools must provide free nutritional meals to students at lunch time.

Our children presented themselves extremely well and delivered very compelling arguments on these topics. They also met with our newly appointed Governor, Doctor Jeanette Young which was a highlight.

Mac Cameron did a very professional job in the role of Sergeant at Arms.

Following are several of their speeches.

Thank you, Mr Speaker. Today, I wish to share with the House my thoughts on the pollution that is happening in the Great Barrier Reef.

More than 80% of marine debris found in our Reef is plastic, which can break up into smaller pieces and travel far distances. This can be a big problem for all of our marine life such as turtles, dolphins, sea birds.

Every year the plastic in the ocean increases by 12.7 million pieces which is being left there and floating freely. Our marine life is going extinct because of all the rubbish which is harming the life of our sea creatures.

Every person including primary school students in the world can make a difference, we need to take responsibility for our actions and start realising what we are doing to the Reef and minimise our use of plastic waste.

Schools with the help of the state government need to stop the use of plastics. This could be by offering incentives for schools that set a target of zero plastics in lunch boxes and in classrooms.

With this in mind I ask everyone to know that we all can make a difference to our oceans, individually and collectively.

Thank you, Madam Speaker. Today I rise to speak about the state of the Yeppoon Aquatic Centre. It is a very important facility and it is necessary that it has some refurbishments in the near future.

The pool and its surroundings are becoming dangerous and unsafe with broken tiles, damaged walls and floors. The risks of falling, slipping or hurting yourself are extremely high.

With the pool being shallow, it does not allow the opportunity to have starting blocks. This means swimmers don't have the chance to practise diving and it rules out any local carnivals. This means athletes have to travel all the time just to compete.

With the upcoming 2032 Brisbane Olympics, athletes from overseas will be coming to train beforehand. Wouldn't it be great if they could come to the Capricorn Coast to do so. It would be a perfect opportunity for the locals and swimmers to learn and train with them. But for this to happen, they would need appropriate facilities which we currently do not have in Yeppoon.

To help this situation, I feel we can undertake fundraising or ask the State Government to be involved.

With this in mind, I ask that the government offer support for our endeavours to upgrade the Yeppoon Aquatic Centre and make it a world class facility.

Thank you, Mr Speaker. I rise to speak against the motion of schools getting a grant if they do 80% of learning non-electronic.

Technology has supercharged the way we learn today, empowering students to be more creative and more connected.

We need to trust the teachers, as professionals, to know when and how often electronic devices can be used.

With this in mind, I oppose the motion that schools receive grants if they have 80% non-electronic learning.


