As a young dad, it was such a delight to hear my children's first words. My daughter hit a juice cup out of her mother's hand and yelled, 'No.' The boys both said, 'Dad.'

Doesn't your heart swell when you hear your name for the first time? How wonderful that this little cute button, knows and unconditionally loves you, raising their arms from the cot for a quick snuggle.

However, if you are like me, there is a time when you may tire of the incessant questions and even regret them knowing your name. *Dad, dad, dad* with a tug on the shirt sleeve. Can I please go to the toilet by myself?

You will be happy to know, once they grow up the chatter dissipates – enjoy it while you can. As teenagers, you may be learning a new language, whereby head nods/shakes and the different gradation of grumps indicates hunger, needing a lift or homework not done.

The development of human language in a child is an amazing journey to observe. As educators and probably as parents, you know of the very strong correlation between children's early language development and success socially and at school.

A child is quite rightly frustrated when they can't express themselves. A child has difficulties reading and writing, if they don't have a broad range of words that are known.

Teachers talk and put up word walls. They encourage the learning of new vocabulary and words linked to the key learning areas they are teaching.

However, we can only do so much.

Overwhelmingly, research shows that language in the home is the foundation for learning. Reading books, giving time to a discussion and having dinner as a family with no TV or screen distractions all helps.

Little ones that come to school with better language skills are set up for learning. So give your child time and have a chat, at least once a day. Dads particularly need to focus and give a child space to talk. You are significant to your child's social and educational development.

On another note, it is interesting to note how families 'think' their values and expectations are known by their child. You may think it obvious that your child does not get in the car with a drunk driver. You may think it is a known fact, that your children are not to do illegal drugs or bully others. But have you really talked about it? As they age, not just 'told' them but 'discussed with them' the challenges and joys ahead in their lives? Young people who are used to talking with their parents are more likely to have settled teenage years.

It is a tricky tight rope however, becoming a smother-mother is also not a good thing.

By the way, the difference between a dog and a cat is amazing.

Humans are extraordinary creatures. From a very early age, we can discern a dog from a cat, even though they have marked varietal differences, think a Siamese cat versus a Ragdoll cat, think a Great Bernhard versus a cattle dog.

Retractable claws in a cat is one thing. What else is there? I leave it to you to have a family discussion about it.

Next week, we remember Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, with a whole school mass for our Year 3s to 6s and class liturgies for our Preps, Year 1s and 2s.

Lent is a special time for our Catholic Church when we are invited to make a new beginning and prepare ourselves for Easter. Prayer, fasting and almsgiving, or giving to the needy, are traditional practices of preparation.

Lent is a time of reflection and anticipation for our Lord's Resurrection.

From Our APC

Throughout the year, data is collected in classrooms for all children. This information is used to direct learning and teaching. Research tells us that using collected data enables more effective evaluation of programs, resources, and interventions to facilitate success.

This week, teachers in their year level, have looked at student results from Reading and Mathematics data collected, to identify strengths and areas for improvement at individual, class and year level requirements. This information will support and drive the next short cycles of planning in classrooms.

Our Prep, Year 1 and 2 children are in the process of undertaking an Oral Language Assessment (OLA). This is a system-wide tool to support teachers as they assess and monitor the development of students' oral language skills. It is vital that the development of listening, speaking and interacting is monitored in ways that enable our learners to receive the support they need.

To support oral language development for children at Sacred Heart, we have purchased the Heggerty Program which is used daily in our Prep, Year 1 and 2 classrooms. The Heggerty Phonemic Awareness Curriculum provides students with consistent and repeated instruction and this transfers to developing a student's decoding and encoding skills.

Currently, students in Years 1 to 6 are completing DRAs (Diagnostic Reading Assessments). Once completed, these are then analysed by the classroom teacher to inform and support the planning and teaching of reading strategies for individual and class learning needs.
