From the Principal's Desk

In 2020, it was estimated by the Australian Government to cost \$548,500 to raise a child to 18 years old.

Many social researchers believe this is a gross under-estimation and that the cost is closer to \$1 million. In addition to the government's predictions, researchers say you need to add the cost of electronics, loss of parental income due to leave taken, private tutoring, sports and dance classes and considering the average child now stays at home until they are 24 years old, the real cost to the Australian parent of raising children is \$1,028,093.

"Generation Z and A, born since 1997, are the most financially endowed generations of children ever. Every child has their own set of everything. We are not in the era of shared toys or hand me downs. The average family has 2.7 children and with 30% of primary school students and 40% of secondary school students in non-government education, parents are more prepared than ever to invest in their kids."

With this in mind, the following reflection crossed my desk recently in response to the financial cost of raising a child.

"You might think the best financial advice is 'Don't have children if you want to be rich'. Actually, it is the opposite. So what do you get for your \$1 million?

Naming rights: First, middle and last.

Glimpses of God everyday.

Giggles under the covers every night.

More love than your heart can hold.

Endless wonders over rocks, ants, clouds, dinosaurs and warm biscuits.

A hand to hold, usually covered in mud or chocolate.

For \$1 million, you never have to grow up. You get to:

Finger paint.

Play hide and seek.

Never stop believing in Santa.

You have an excuse to:

Keep watching Saturday morning cartoons.

Go to Disney movies.

Keep reading the adventures of Piglet and Winnie the Pooh.

Frame rainbows, hearts and flowers under fridge magnets.

Collect spray painted noodle wreaths for Christmas, hand prints set in clay for Mother's Day and cards with backwards letters for Father's Day.

You get a front row seat to history to witness the:

First step.

First word.

First bra.

First date.

First time behind the wheel.

You get to be immortal. You get another branch to your family tree, and if you are lucky, a long list of limbs in your obituary called grandchildren and great grandchildren. You get an education in psychology, nursing, criminal justice, communications, and human sexuality that no college can match.

In the eyes of a child, you rank right up there under God. You have all the power to heal a scratch, scare away the monsters under the bed, patch a broken heart, police a sleepover party, ground them forever and love them without limits."

This week, having returned from our final Year 4 camp at the Caves, I was faced with quite a few school emails to answer, several parents to call and incidents to follow up. Having not slept in my own bed for three nights, I was a little tired so I decided to visit my daughter and our soon to be two year old granddaughter. Maggie. Her squeals of excitement as I knocked on the front door and her kiss on the cheek were worth every bit of that \$1,028,093.

Reconciliation must live in the hearts, minds and actions of all Australians, creating a nation strengthened by respectful relationships between the wider Australian community, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Over the next few weeks, new teachers to Sacred Heart will participate in two writing workshops to learn from each other and strengthen their knowledge and understanding of the writing process.

The Catholic Education Diocese's goal is 'For teachers to engage in participatory action learning about writing development in order that all students may meet or exceed the year level writing expectations'.

What we know about writing:

- Writing is a thinking process.
- Writers need to think about their thinking and knowing metacognition and monitoring.
- Writing processes are cyclic.
- Engagement and motivation are essential.
- We need a joint focus on knowing how to write as well as knowing what to write.


Students will learn:

- Authors provide models of how to write using different tools and structures to communicate ideas.
- Authors offer 'gifts of words' for children to borrow. 'Read like a Writer'.
- Readers provide a response to texts written by others.
- When children write, they are writing texts for others to read and understand 'Write like a reader'.

Ultimately, the goal is for all learners at Sacred Heart to see themselves as an author.

While discussing writing and authors, and this week being Reconciliation Week, along with many of us tuning into the first State of Origin game last night, it is a timely opportunity to showcase a wonderful children's book called 'Going to the Footy' written by indigenous author and illustrator, Debbie Coombes.

This book combines richly textured and striking illustrations of iconic Australian modes of transport, with some gentle humour.
