Children in Years Two to Six have just completed their PAT (Progressive Achievement Tests) assessments for spelling.

In weeks two and three, next term, students will complete a PAT assessment for Mathematics and reading.

These assessments inform teachers of student progressions in these areas of their learning. They are used to support planning for individual children, classes and year levels.

Assessments such as these and NAPLAN are diagnostic and are not used to solely inform report card achievements.



Swimming Term 4

Week 2 Term 4 will see the start of swimming lessons for our Year 2 and 3 classes.

These take place at the Cooee Bay aquatic complex, with our children being bussed to and from the venue.

Children will need to bring their school uniform, including underwear, shoes and socks in their bag so they can get changed on their return to school.

Swimming lessons costs will be added to Term 4 school fees. These are conducted by qualified instructors.
