Keep it calm, keep it in perspective, do not get personal and be open to negotiation. We know that our children who see modelled by their parents/carers and who are encouraged to 'fight fair', make better partners and co-workers. Research shows that learning to forgive and move on are keys to life contentment.

As one of our greatest prayers, "The Our Father" says,

"Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who have sinned against us."

If everything people in the world did, was predicated with the thought that God's forgiveness depends on my own capacity for forgiveness, I know our world would be much better off.
