From the Principal's Desk

One of the terrifying rites of passage is facing up to any type of interview, particularly when applying for a new job.

Below are some real incidents that were gathered by American company presidents that typify what not to do in an interview situation:

- Candidate explained that her long-term goal was to replace the interviewer.

- Applicant interrupted the interview to phone their therapist for advice on how to answer specific interview questions.

Some unusual questions asked include;

"Why aren't you in a more interesting business?"

"What are the zodiac signs of all the board members?"

"I know this is off the subject, but will you marry me?"

"Would it be a problem if I'm angry most of the time?"

Jokes aside, a not so terrifying but a necessary process at any school are the formal interviews between parents and teachers. If you remember interviews were at the start of Term 2 and will again be held during weeks 2 and 3 of Term 4.

Parent-teacher interviews give you a great opportunity to: learn more about your child's academic, emotional and social development, meet and get to know your child's teacher and help your child's teacher understand more about your child.

You have a massive impact on your child's educational success. Research shows supportive parental engagement with a teacher is a key to a child's academic and emotional success.

It has been wonderful to see so many of our parents/carers around school each week attending assemblies, at drop off and pick up times, assisting with breakfast club and tuckshop.

I ask all families to book a time for an interview with their child's / children's teacher/s and be present at school. Information regarding this is provided in this newsletter.

It is important to remember that after the interview to discuss the meeting with your child and really congratulate them on their strengths. When the teacher makes suggestions of things you could do at home, discuss these with your child and commit to following through with them.

If you don't go to a parent-teacher interview, you're also missing out on the chance to hear the positive things about your child that they may not tell you themselves.

It's just as rewarding for teachers to share good news with you. Also, the ways in which you can assist your child with their learning.

Parent teacher interviews are not a 'necessary evil' to be avoided but to be celebrated.

Year 4 Child Convict Diary Writing

Convict Story

My name is Denis Marshall and I am 12 years old. My parents died in a carriage crash which put me in an orphanage. One very cold night there was no food to be found so I crept outside and saw someone holding a chick. When they weren't looking I snatched the chick and ran away but they caught me. A few days later I was in the court then got 7 years transportation to N.S.W. The ship I was put on was the 'Lady Penrhyn'.

The next day I was thrown onto the ship and saw Neveah, someone I knew from the orphanage. I walked up to her nervously but I got punched in the face by a girl called Lily. I whimpered silently but she just kept hitting me. Beside her was her friend Lilit and she was dying of laughter. Moments later a guard came and escorted them away from me. I looked up and saw Neveah standing above me, she looked extremely worried, and that was the last thing I saw before I blacked out.

Our first stop was when I woke up we were at the Canary Islands. I hopped off board and headed to a guard but they just took me to the rest of the convicts. We went back to the ship shortly and we started sailing again. The 8 weeks we were back on the water was very plain and nothing exciting happened that I knew of. When we were at Rio, I was asleep but when I walked to the port Neveah came back to the ship, she gave me a smile then walked away. Right behind her were 2 guards that wouldn't leave her side. I was super confused about what she had done but decided not to bother. I'd known Neveah half of her life and she was the sweetest girl ever! I looked into the water because it reminded me of my mum and I admiring the waves. I had a tear of joy roll down my cheek, as I was about to walk away something caught my eye, in the water was a red spot. I took a closer look then realised it was Lilit! The guards had thrown her overboard! Although I was sad, but relieved, it would be less trouble for me. I knew even if Lilit was still alive I'd have Neveah. Or so I thought.

I looked over at Neveah but all she did was glance at me with a devious grin. She had one hand behind her back and staring right at Lily, meanwhile Lily looked frightened screaming with fear. At that exact moment it hit me, Neveah revealed a sharp pocket knife and lunged at Lily, but before she could the guards grabbed her then took her to the captain. I was in utter shock, I had no words. The ship stopped sharply, I watched secretly as a few guards executed Neveah. My eyes filled with tears as my friend just got killed.

A few guards got into the water and buried her, a few people were in tears, others were in delight. I had a headache from the silence around me. Momentarily a guard sent everyone to their cells. I was in one with Lily. I fell asleep but in the corner of my eye I saw another sailor get thrown

My convict life

Hi I'm Grace. My mother died when I was born and my father died when I was 3, so I'm an orphan. It's not that bad in the orphanage as I have a friend named Lily. She's really nice but one day I got sick of the orphanage and escaped. I got really hungry with no money so I decided to steal a loaf of bread and I went to London Prison for 3 months. Then I got transported for 7 years to NSW on the "Friendship". 32 people got thrown off the ship because they died.

I was just playing around when I tripped. The Ship surgeon Goodyermore helped me and put a bandage on and I felt better. For dinner we had soup with veggies and bread. It was DISGUSTING. It tastes like old soup, rotten veggies and mouldy bread. That night when I went to bed I could not sleep. The beds are hammocks and they are really uncomfy and they're hard as rock. Instead of going to Botany Bay, Captain Walton decided to go to Port Jackson. I was so disappointed because now we now have to spend 7 more days/months in Friendship again.

It has been a year now and I am 14 now so to celebrate nurse goddess made me a cake. I am now assigned to nurse goddess. Finally we got to port jackson. but On the journey way out of the ship the nurse goddess Surgeon Goodyer got bitten by a rat and rushed to the clinic where his sister worked as a medic also horrible. The police said that I could be assigned to Surgeon Goodyer's nurse goddess sister. Mr and Mrs Goodyergoddess and took me in to be their maid. As I stepped into their house, I was amazed. Their house looked like it was made out of diamonds and clear crystals. They brought me to my room and it was beautiful with I have my own balcony. Mrs. Goddyress taught me how to cook. She makes delicious apple pie. It's amazing. A couple of weeks later Mrs Goddyress found out she was pregnant! We were all very happy. As Mr and Mrs Goodyer's maids/esses maid I swept the floors, I dusted the lamps and tables, I made the beds. I cleaned the bathrooms and mopped the floors. Mr and Mrs Goodyergoddess were very happy with me and so for dinner Mrs Goddess made pasta. I love pasta. Mr. Goodyergoddess gave me a book. He said he read books when he was younger and wanted to give this one to me. I read a bit before bed, then I fell asleep. In the morning I woke up early and started cleaning the kitchen and made my bed. Then Mr Goodyergoddess came to me with good news. He said that the baby was going to come in a few months and he or she will be sharing a room with me. "That's wonderful," I answered. For breakfast we had bacon and eggs. But I just had a piece of toast with butter

My Convict Life

Hi my name is Michelle Llanckin, I am 13 years old and I am from London, my life was beautiful until my mum lost her job at the mines, and she was broke.

So that night I went out and stole from an old man. He called the cops on me and I didn't even get to see mum until I went to court the next day.

The next day when I came in, mum hugged me but then she was pulled away. They treated me like I was an adult. The judge sentenced me to seven years' transportation to New South Wales.

When boarding there were 200 soldiers. The ship was mouldy, rotten and dusty. All the other ships looked beautiful. When it was dinner time they fed us hard biscuits and beef. That night we finally got to go into our cells. I thought it was going to be better.

One day later I met a friend called Mary Hilton, she was caught stealing water for her family. We ate together, we even played paper, scissors, rock. I mostly won. The next day there was a storm and everyone was out at the front of the ship. We all made it inside the boat but Mary did not make it in and she fell overboard, I had lost my best and only friend.

Two days later the boat arrived at Santa Cruz, there were two lady's, one was called Mel Hanna, her crime was stealing cards, the other one was called Kate Ffarmendil, her crime was robbing the bank two times. They walked in and Kate spit in one of the workers face, they took her straight to her cell and locked her in for the day. She was crying, sulking and even begging the guards

My Life As a Convict

Hi my name is Hudson Daniel, I was caught stealing a pistol from a cop when I was 8 because my family was really poor, when I was young. I got sentenced to 30 hits of the whip and sentenced to 7 years transportation to the colony of New South Wales.

After spending 5 months in the London prison I was put aboard the 'Lady Lucy' for the voyage to Sydney Cove. With the money I got from the pistol I bought food for my family and helped with our bills. But I got caught because the cop that I stole the pistol from had recognized my face. That same cop that I stole the pistol from caught me the next day. After I got caught I stayed in the London prison for 5 months like I said before. Once I got on the lady Lucy ship it was terrible.

Each morning aboard the "Lady Lucy" we had sloppy porridge with a tiny bit of rat poop in it that was disgusting. Over 5 people spewed each morning, after eating the sloppy porridge. And since we were on the ship for so long all of the salt beef got rotten and mouldy and they still made us eat it. Also they washed the plates, bowls, forks and spoons once a week you could taste other peoples saliva in most of them. They didn't trust us with knives, they didn't even trust us with butter knives because they thought we would stab someone. The ship was cramped, the air was stale, and it was so hot each day I was sweating so much like I just had a shower.

My Convict Life

Hi, my name is Cameron Smith. I was born in 1775 so I'm 12 years old. I was charged with stealing bread. But it was for my family so I had to go to the judge the next day, and I was scared and my family was already struggling. I went to the judge the next day and then I got sentenced to 7 years transportation to the colony of NSW. So I stayed in the London prison for 2 months. I know the voyage to NSW will be really long and hard so hopefully I will make friends.

After 2 months I got put aboard the worst ship the 'Prince of Wales for the voyage'. I met two really naughty people named Henry and William. They always yelled out that someone got bitten by a rat and the crew members always fell for it. Then we had dinner it was decent then we had to go to bed. The beds were terrible they were so uncomfortable and I didn't like how there was no showers. Then finally we made it to Santa Cruz. It took 13 days because we had no food, so the next day I made a friend his name is Beau. Beau is a 25 five year old. The two bad things about the ship is that everyone is sick and there is dirty old rats everywhere.

Then we got to rio de janeiro so we could be on the deck for a little bit. There was heavy rains storms 15 people died in the first 6 months and I was so dirty. The worst dinner so far was probably the rotten beef. I couldn't wait until we got to Botany. I don't want it to be tomorrow though because it's the worst day to be a convict.

We have to work all day, we have to do workouts. Then the next day it was actually pretty easy but dinner was the worst part about the day we had wet rotten bread. When we got to bed Beau sat on a spiky thing turns out it was a needle. So the next day we got to Botany Bay Going but then the captain said I don't like to Sydney Cove which is 6 days away

.When we got to Sydney Cove we had to go straight to work. My job was feeding the other convicts. So five years later now I'm 17 years I have a girlfriend but the people in charge said you can't have a relationship. I

My convict life

My name is Austen Carige. I am 16 years old. I was caught for killing a soldier and using his clothes to get into the main office and assassinate Duke Sydney to get some money. I was sentenced to 10 years transportation to Van Diemen's Land Before.

I was in the London prison. I got in my cell and spent 7 months eating on the floor and writing writing in this book. Then I got whipped 90 times and then salt water poured on me.

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¶ On the trip to Australia. ¶ There was a lot of sickness. For all I know over 100 people died. It stinks down here. The food was fine until 1 month ago it got rotten mouldy. I hate that some people are going crazy. You gotta fight to survive. It's my birthday soon but I know that they won't celebrate it so let's not talk about it. But we hit the Canary Island it's crazy. I finally got to go out for some fresh air. I'm sick and tired from that sick graveyard. I got to smell the nice delicious food sadly, it's for the guards. They treat us like rats, like we treat the rats, in the deck, but we had to leave soon. So after another 3 months of being on the ship I finally got to hop on fresh land. and I'm 17 yep, my birthday passed.

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¶ I'm finally on land, beautiful land. I'm in the worst prison there, so I had to man all up. I went in my cell then found out (that someone cleaner died) so I said I would clean for them. so I met her and found out that she has no family to so as soon as I got in I know what to do, I did the dishes, swept,

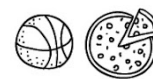
