Ever feel your days are passing by without any real tangible output of which to speak.

What did you accomplish last week? What are your goals for this week?

Well over the past four days, our Year 6s, Mrs Bell, Mrs Evans, Mr McIntosh, Mrs Kenny, Mr O'Brien and myself have experienced and accomplished a great deal.

My highlights have included:

Movie World where many were encouraged by their peers and indeed mustered up the courage to attack rides such as DC Rivals Hypercoaster (which is the tallest, longest and fastest coaster in the southern hemisphere, travelling at 115 km/hr), Green Lantern, Batwing Spaceshot, Wild West Falls Adventure, Superman Escape and Doomsday Destroyer. They sound scary and lived up to their names.



Our visit to Time Zone where 60 children danced, shot hoops, tested their strength on the punching bag and hammer hit, became pinball wizards, mastered air hockey, rode super bikes and Formula 1 cars, all in the space of 90 minutes. We were exhausted.

The courage, determination and agility shown by our 6s as they manoeuvred and jumped their hearts out on at least 40 different trampolines at Bounce. The ninja warrior course at this venue challenged everyone.

Their immaculate behaviour at Parliament House where we learnt about our state government and held their own parliamentary session, passing a bill on homework.

Many thanks to our Year 6 teachers, Mrs Kenny and Mr O'Brien. A huge thank you to Mrs Todman and Mrs Murphy for organising the itinerary and all the finer details of our trip.

Our Year 6s have certainly lived life to the fullest this week.

From Our APRE

The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month marks a significant day in our history. It is Remembrance Day, a time to remember and reflect, not only on those who made the ultimate sacrifice but also on the events that led to this day of international importance.

Originally, Remembrance Day was established to commemorate the end of World War I and the signing of the Armistice at 11 am on November 11, 1918. Today, we remember those who gave their lives while serving in various wars, conflicts, and peacekeeping operations.

At 5am on that momentous day in 1918, representatives of France, Britain, and Germany gathered in a railway carriage in France to sign the document that ended four years of conflict. Six hours later, at 11 am, the Armistice took effect, bringing an end to World War I.

The news of peace spread worldwide, and even in Australia, despite the late hour, school, fire station, and church bells rang out, waking people to the news that the war was over.



Amid the celebrations, there was also a profound sense of loss and grief.

Over 60,000 Australian soldiers had made the ultimate sacrifice, with more than 150,000 wounded or taken prisoner, and around 23,000 were missing. Nearly every Australian family had a connection to the war effort.

The Treaty of Versailles wasn't signed until June 1919, and many soldiers, despite returning home, carried the scars of the battlefields with them.

In Australia, the one-minute silence at 11am on November 11th was formalised in 1997 by Governor-General, Sir William Deane, who proclaimed Remembrance Day.

Everyone is encouraged to attend a service to pay their respects, and if you can't, you can set a reminder in your calendar, switch your phone to 'do not disturb,' and take one minute to remember. A simple action that means a lot.

The red poppy is also a symbol connected to Remembrance Day. Known as the 'Flower of Remembrance', red poppies were amongst the first to bloom on the battlefields of northern France and Belgium after the war ended. This vibrant red bloom was adopted as an emblem to honour the fallen and support the living, first in England in 1919 and Australia in 1921.

Let us remember and honour those who gave their lives in service to our country, those who returned home injured or ill, and those who continue to serve courageously today.

Our Year 5L class is presenting our Remembrance Day assembly tomorrow, Friday from 8.40am. Your attendance is always greatly appreciated.

On Monday, students in 4M participated in a Trends in International Mathematics and Science (TIMSS) assessment. This is a global assessment, with 580 schools across Australia participating this year.

Below are student comments about this assessment.

Noah: I was surprised that all the questions were so different, with lots of variety from the start. It was challenging getting the assessments finished in the time given.

Aria: It was surprising that some questions I answered we learnt in Year 2 and 3. I was challenged with some questions that were quite difficult.

Lucy: I thought it was positive doing both tests in one day and that the questions were random. Some of the language in the test was challenging, I had to think about what it was asking.

Beau: I was surprised because I was expecting the test to be really tricky and scary. It was easier than I thought it would be. The questions in the student survey were challenging, having to decide if I agreed or disagreed.

World Kindness Day

World Kindness Day is celebrated on Monday 13th November, offering an opportunity to highlight good deeds in the community and the common thread of kindness.

Kindness is important to a child's development. Studies have found that acts of kindness are linked to increased feelings of well-being. It has also been shown to increase self-esteem, empathy, compassion, and improve mood.
