From the Principal

Many years ago three soldiers, hungry and weary of battle, came upon a small village. The villagers, suffering from a poor harvest and the many years of war, quickly hid what little they had to eat and met the three at the village square, wringing their hands and bemoaning the lack of anything to eat.

The soldiers spoke quietly amongst themselves, and the first soldier then turned to the village elders. "Your tired fields have left you nothing to share, so we will share what little we have: the secret of how to make soup from stones."

Naturally the villagers were intrigued and soon a fire was put to the town's greatest kettle as the soldiers dropped in three smooth stones. "Now this will be a fine soup", said the second soldier; "but a pinch of salt and some parsley would make it wonderful."

Up jumped a villager, crying "What luck. I've just remembered where some has been left." And off she ran, returning with an apron full of parsley and a turnip. As the kettle boiled on, the memory of the village improved, soon barley, carrots, beef and cream had found their way into the great pot and a cask of wine was rolled into the square as all sat down to feast.

They ate and danced and sang well into the night, refreshed by the feast and their new-found friends. In the morning, the three soldiers awoke to find the entire village standing before them. At their feet lay a satchel of the village's best breads and cheese. "You have given us the greatest of gifts, the secret of how to make soup from stones", said an elder, "and we shall never forget." The third soldier turned to the crowd, and said, "There is no secret, but this is certain: it is only by sharing that we may make a feast". And off the soldiers wandered.

Two Fridays ago, our children and staff arrived at school sporting very colourful and some unusual foot attire for Crazy Sock Day. Not only was it great to show off our socks but there was an underlying emphasis to raise money for those less fortunate than ourselves. Together, we raised over \$1300 which was an amazing effort.

At Sacred Heart, our aim is to nurture each child in their emotional, academic, physical, cultural and spiritual growth and in doing so provide them with a learning environment where they can reach their full potential.

Teaching our children empathy is an extremely important part of their holistic development and very much part of our school's religious education program. Empathy is the ability to put yourself in the shoes of someone else and understand what they are feeling or experiencing.

It is through experiences similar to Crazy Sock Day that a child's sense of empathy is hopefully heightened.

In the coming weeks, we are asking all our families to contribute to the 'Linking Alms Christmas Appeal' (Alms means the giving of material items to the needy) in support of our local St Vincent De Paul which does an outstanding job assisting families and individuals financially and emotionally over the holiday/Christmas period.

These donated items can be brought to school. Last year, the response from our families with festive season foods, toys, decorations etc was overwhelming and hopefully, we can be as generous this year.

The story of the 'Stone Soup' is a reminder that together we are able to assist with the spirit of giving during the Christmas period which for many of our Yeppoon and school families is a difficult time.

After World War II, German students volunteered to help rebuild a cathedral in England, one of many casualties of the Luftwaffe bombings. As the work progressed, debate broke out on how to best restore a large statue of Jesus with His arms outstretched and bearing the familiar inscription, 'Come unto Me.' Careful patching would repair all damage to the statue except for Christ's hands, which had been destroyed by bomb fragments. Should they attempt the delicate task of reshaping those hands?

Finally the workers reached a decision that still stands today. The statue of Jesus has no hands, and the inscription now reads, 'Christ has no hands on Earth but ours.'

From the APC

This week, in our Professional Learning Communities (PLCs), teachers came together to moderate students' English work samples and data gathered throughout the semester to prepare for reporting.

Moderation practices for assessment play a critical role in ensuring fairness, consistency, and transparency in education.

There are four key elements to successful assessment moderation processes in schools: equity, justification, accountability, and community building.

1. Equity

- Fair Assessment: Moderation ensures that all students are assessed according to the same standards, minimising bias and creating a level playing field. This is especially important in diverse classrooms where students come from different backgrounds and have varying levels of support.
- Differentiation: Teachers can use moderation to identify the needs of all learners, ensuring that assessment tasks are inclusive and equitable and cater to students with different abilities and learning styles.
- 2. Justification
 - Transparent Processes: Moderation provides a transparent framework for assessment. When teachers collaborate to review and discuss student work, they foster a shared understanding of what constitutes quality work and help justify grades awarded to students.

- Evidence-Based Decisions: The use of a moderation process helps justify the decisions made regarding student achievement, ensuring they are based on evidence rather than subjective opinions.
- 3. Accountability
 - Standards Consistency: By engaging in moderation, schools can hold themselves accountable to the educational standards set out in the Australian Curriculum and the Queensland Curriculum Assessment Authority (QCAA). This practice ensures that the quality of education and assessment remains high and consistent across different classrooms within the school.
 - Data-Driven Improvement: Moderation processes can also be used to evaluate the effectiveness of teaching practices and curriculum implementation, promoting a culture of continuous improvement in teaching and learning.
- 4. Community-Building
 - Collaboration Among Educators: Moderation practices promote collaboration among teachers, fostering a sense of community as they work together to develop a shared understanding of assessment criteria and standards.

Over the coming weeks, teachers will be completing report cards. These will be available via Parent Lounge on Tuesday of Week 10.
