From the Principal

Even though we are only mid November, you can 'smell' Christmas in the air. Last weekend, my wonderful wife assembled our Christmas tree which flies in the face of tradition as they in Australia are not supposed to go up until the first Sunday in December (The first day of Advent this year 1st December).

And already we have been bombarded on social media and television with festive season trappings.

We can lament the early 'Christmas period' inspired by consumerism but, deep down, I think most of us get excited about this true, annual family holiday. Traditionally, it is a time to gather with our loved ones, reconcile and really enjoy ourselves.

Their top marks on the Happiness Index are credited to their unique cultural choice on how to live life. It is known as 'hygge' meaning 'cosiness' (Pronounced 'hooga'). It has been a buzz word that swept the world of self-improvement, promising to make your life better, happier and cosier with just a few steps.

According to Helen Russell, author of *The Year of Living Danishly: Uncovering the Secrets of the World's Happiest Country, "*hygge seems to me to be about being kind to yourself - indulging, having a nice time, not punishing or denying yourself anything. There isn't so much enforced deprivation in Denmark, instead they're kinder to themselves and to each other. Danes don't binge then purge. There's not much yo-yo dieting in Denmark. No wonder they're happier than we are in the UK."

A UK college has started teaching students the Danish concept of hygge, said to make homes more welcoming and people happier.

The Danish life philosophy is about simple pleasures, about savouring the good things in life, be it cosy sheepskin rugs, flaky pastries or cups of hot chocolate. In essence, hygge means creating a warm atmosphere and enjoying, in a simple way, the good things in life with good people.

A big part of Danish happiness is savouring the day that you are in.

Stop looking forward, waiting for a happiness moment, enjoy the time that you have now.

In gratitude, they dedicated Mary to God's service, bringing her to the temple at the age of three.

Presentation Day is also a time to remember the outstanding work of the Presentation Sisters who started our school. Their founder, Nano Nagle is described as 'the kind of person to win a Nobel Prize' if she were alive today. She opened seven schools for underprivileged children across Cork City in Ireland and founded a charity house to support women.

The Presentation Sisters continue her education and social inclusion work today, helping the poor and vulnerable around the world.

They arrived in Yeppoon in 1917. Their commitment to education and community service has shaped our school's mission and vision. The Sisters are still active in twenty countries around the world.

Inspired by Nano, our school embraces the charism of helping those in need. Our Mini Vinnies group is a testament to this. This social action group consists of over fifty students who volunteer their lunchtimes to organise and run charity events throughout the year.

The values that guide Mini Vinnies are:

- **Courage:** Having the strength to stand up for what is right, even when it is difficult or unpopular.
- **Being Just:** Treating everyone fairly and with respect, ensuring that all actions are guided by a sense of fairness and equality.
- **Compassion:** Showing kindness and understanding towards others, especially those who are suffering or in need.

This year, our Mini Vinnies group has supported many organisations like St Vincent de Paul, Missions Australia, Caritas and the residents of the Capricorn Adventist Retirement Village.

The representative school sport permission details booklet (consent form) has the required documentation that schools / district / regions need for students to participate in trials. The form, once completed, is to be handed in to our school to be signed by Mr Martin. The forms which need to be submitted at the trial, will be returned to the student.

We encourage you where possible to fill the form out electronically to assist with eligibility and accuracy of the documents, however handwritten copies are acceptable.

All permission booklets need to be submitted to school no later than 4 days prior to the trial to allow time for signing and associated paperwork. Students will not be permitted to trial on the day without the completed consent forms.

Colour Run

Tomorrow, 22nd November, we will be having a Colour Run on our oval as a fundraiser for the St Vincent de Paul Christmas Appeal.

The colour run powder paint is non-toxic, non-flammable, skin safe, environmentally friendly and biodegradable.

Sacred Heart community members wishing to volunteer are asked to read the required risk assessment and sign before the day, to fulfill the school's legal responsibilities. This can be accessed at the school office.

Year 6 Orientation Day at St Ursula's College


