Recently, I learnt an interesting fact about elephants.

When elephants are owned by a circus or zoo they often only tether these huge creatures by a very fine rope tied to their front leg. No chains, no cages are actually necessary. Even though it is obvious that elephants could, if they chose, break away from their bonds, for some reason, they do not.


The reason is this...

When the elephants are just babies, trainers tie a thin rope to their legs and attach it to a stake in the ground. The little animals tug and pull but cannot escape.

The size and strength of the rope is never changed. As elephants grow up, they are conditioned to believe they cannot break away. They believe the rope can still hold them, so they never try to break free.

Elephants could at any time escape from their bonds but because they believe they can't, they don't even try.

Like the elephants, how many of us go through life hanging onto a belief that we cannot do something, simply because we failed at it once before? Simply because we couldn't do it when we were younger or because someone discouraged us. Or maybe the ropes that bind us are anger or laziness or lack of direction. Maybe our ropes are the inability to forgive a hurt from the past.

I always look forward to Wednesday Prep PE lessons. It has been a privilege to see our little chargers grow, physically, emotionally and intellectually over the past nine months. This week, they mastered several ball handling activities that last term would have been far beyond their skill set (probably of many adults as well). The great quality of a Prep is that they are not afraid to 'have a go' at something new or difficult.

The following passage has been written by one of our Year 6s as part of their yearbook reflection on a fond school memory. This student was once a reluctant writer yet this entry shows maturing literary skills.

"I woke up in the morning to a bright, hot sun and a blue sky, ready to pack my bag for Year Four camp. The bus driver with his glasses, his titanium white beard and his grinning smile, loaded our belongings ready for our adventure. We were off on our forty-five minute trip to the Capricorn Caves. We finally arrived and left to go to our first activity; rock climbing. I started off like a champion, seizing each little rock I saw. Eventually I reached the top and then my helpers lowered me down.

The next morning, we were off adventure caving. The Whale's Belly was a really tight hole that you had to navigate your way through. I did fine apart from when my foot became stuck.

Over the past two weeks, children in Years Two to Six have just completed their PAT (Progressive Achievement Tests) assessments for Mathematics and reading.

These assessments inform teachers of student progressions in these areas of their learning. They are used to support planning for individual children, classes and year levels.

Assessments such as these and NAPLAN are diagnostic and are not used to solely inform report card achievements.

The benefits of these assessments include:

- Diagnose starting points establishing what students are capable of, then challenging them at the appropriate level for effective learning.
- Monitor student progress assessing at recommended intervals to measure learning growth over time.
- Reporting at an individual, group or year level in a quick and easy manner.
- Evidence using data to understand where students are in their learning journey.

This week, our Book Fair was held, with many families and all our classes visiting the library. This is a wonderful opportunity for our library, with twenty percent of sales going to purchase new books and resources.
