Six Reasons Not To Mess With A Child

Every learner in every school deserves an outstanding Mathematics education and ongoing opportunities to become "confident, creative users and communicators of mathematics" (ACARA, 2019).

With this statement in mind, Mathematics at Sacred Heart has been identified as one of our school priorities over the next few years.

This year, a Mathematics Project team, comprising of Mrs Becky Du Plooy, Mrs Marise Shammall, Mrs Meagan Goltz and I have participated in workshops and planning sessions facilitated by John Campbell from the Catholic Education Office.

Leading research in Mathematics has been used to support and guide new practices, planning and hands-on activities in these teacher's classrooms.

Our goal is to develop high-performing mathematics coaches across the school, leading to outstanding learning and positive mindsets in every classroom.

Peter Liljedahl and Jo Boaler, both authors of books read to unpack their forward-thinking ideas for use in the classroom, share similar messages:

- Students need informative feedback, which goes beyond getting the right answer to work towards finding solutions.
- Productive struggle is the kind of effortful learning that develops grit and creative problemsolving. It results in students understanding content at a deeper level and applying that learning to more difficult and complex problems.
- The classroom environment is essential for rich learning, allowing students to work vertically, use a variety of resources and collaborate with peers to solve deep thinking, challenging and engaging tasks.

Students have been highly engaged in learning activities, below are some of their thoughts and comments:


- I enjoyed it because I got out of my desk.
- I liked working with a partner because it's easier when you have someone to help you.
- I enjoyed it because I got to work with different people.
- I liked it because you go to help each other and I enjoyed getting out of my seat.
- It is a fun way to do Maths. We get to do more than just sit and write. It's engaging and physical.
- I like working in random groups with people I do not expect.
- It makes Maths more fun and interesting. I enjoy the challenging questions and working in a group.

What about our teachers' thoughts on engaging with this innovative approach, below are what they have experienced so far:

Mrs Du Plooy: The biggest takeaway regarding the Maths Project has been seeing how far my children's thinking has been stretched. They are taking more risks, feeling comfortable solving problems, and sharing their thinking with other students in the class after our number talks.

Mrs Shammall: I have thoroughly enjoyed my involvement in the Leading Maths Project. Each professional development day provides us with a wealth of practical and engaging mathematical activities. The students in 3S have particularly enjoyed the dynamic learning environment, working in small groups, and tackling challenging mathematical tasks. Feedback from my class has been extremely positive and each Friday the students look forward to trying a new esti-mystery.

Mrs Goltz: Being a part of the Leading Maths Project has been very rewarding. Students of all abilities are finding the new teaching strategies and activities enjoyable, engaging, and challenging. They now look forward to Mathematics lessons with enthusiasm.

Thank you to our Year 2K class for presenting a very heartfelt assembly for our grandparents.






















Year 3 Visit from Father Matthew Moloney
