#### From The Principal's Desk

I once again had to pinch myself when 390 children and 25 staff made their way to the beach for some sand castling. The sight of a sea of red shirts beetling in the sand, interacting so positively together and being so totally engrossed in what we were doing, was amazing. You know that the simple things in life provide the most pleasure when you see Year 5 and 6 boys attempting to build the highest sand construction and totally enjoying every moment. Tunnels in the sand are great, too.

Well done to all our teachers and staff and especially our APRE, Mrs Melissa Collins for organising the day.

During the afternoon session, I was able to take one of our Year Five classes and continue to read them an abridged version of the classic novel, "Doctor Jekyll and Mr Hyde". We are getting close to the end and they appear to be really enjoying it.

I told them of my Year Seven teacher, Mr Tony Wilmott who read us from cover to cover, 'The Hobbit" by J. R. Tolkien. I can still remember vividly, it was not so much the content of the novel that engaged us but the manner in which he read with his change of voices when Bilbo Baggins, Gollum, Gandalf or Thorin would come to life.

Or when my Year Nine teacher, Mr Faulkner chose for us to read, "Lord Of The Flies" as a class novel. What a great story and one that a group of teenage boys could relate to.

This brought back memories of the times our three children would jump into our lounge and beg to be told or read a story. Our favourites were 'Spot The Dog' and 'Grug' books.

If you want to get your kids' attention? Then start telling them a story and watch them tune in. "Let me tell you a story ...." is enough to get the attention of even hard-nosed children.

Telling and reading stories is a wonderful part of being a parent. "Just one more story, please" is hard to refuse. Story time is a special time that you have with your children that often stays for the rest of their lives.

Stories also have enormous benefits. Teachers know full well the educational benefits of parents reading and telling stories. Reading and story-telling increases kids' vocabularies, teaches them about cause and effect and sequencing of events and teaches them more about their expanding world.

But those aren't the only benefits of telling kids stories. Here are some non-educational benefits:

- 1. Stories help children deal with feelings and emotions. If you read a story about a child who is afraid of the dark, it helps them to know that they are not the only ones who feel that way. Hearing the same story many times helps children deal with their fears and other emotions.
- **2. Stories can help develop a sense of belonging:** When parents and grandparents tell stories about themselves ('When your mum was a little girl......') this develops a sense of confidence that comes from a strong feeling of connection and family history.
- **3. Stories provide a great sense of escape:** A good story stimulates the imagination and takes children to another world. Getting away from things for a while is an essential mental health skill.

**4. Stories build connections between the teller and listener:** My three tell me that some of their fondest memories come from story time especially from their mother who always had a 'very famous story' to tell.

Stories don't have to be at bed-time. There are plenty of times when you can introduce a book or tell a story. A special story time at bedtime can help your child look forward to going to bed, to enjoy being close to you and to relax, ready for sleep. Most importantly your child will thrive on spending time with you. (From Michael Gross, parent consultant)

A few weeks ago, we heard about a programme called Envision Hands that uses the plastic tops from milk bottles, water bottles (flat lids only) and soft drink bottles, to create 3D plastic prosthetic arms for children in Third World countries. Visit the website and read all about it.
